Some pastors, mightily endowed by God, are remarkable gifts to the church.... We thank God for such Christian leaders from the past and pray for the current ones.... Most of us, however, serve in more modest patches.... Most of us – let us be frank – are ordinary pastors. Dad was one of them. This little book is a modest attempt to let the voice and ministry of one ordinary pastor be heard, for such servants have much to teach us. (Introduction in *Memoirs of an Ordinary Pastor: The Life and Reflections of Tom Carson*)


