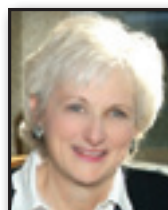

The Lincoln Sites

"Mr. & Mrs. Abe" will be our tour guides on this trip to Springfield. We will visit the Old State Capitol and the Lincoln home. As a legislator, Lincoln had been instrumental in moving the capital from Vandalia to Springfield. The Old State Capitol is a state historic site that is a beautiful recreation of the statehouse as it was during Lincoln's years and the site of the famous "House Divided" speech. His body lay in state in this building as a crowd of 75,000 mourners filed past to pay their last respects. The Lincoln home, restored to its 1860 appearance, is the only home that Lincoln ever owned. Purchased in 1844, he and Mary lived there for 17 years. The cost for the tour is \$5.00 per person.
