





commercial hybrid corn. His grandson traveled extensively for the Funk Brothers Seed Co. and collected gems and minerals from around the world. The farm was electrified in 1910 (first in the world) and the 13-room home, built in 1864, has been extensively restored to its original condition. The museum houses more than 4,000 specimens, from gemstones of every type to an intact saber-toothed tiger skull! The cost of the bus trip is \$5.00/person.
