Preparing for Tomorrow by Equipping the Church Today





Funk Prairie Home and Gem & Mineral Museum

Lafayette Funk was a founder of the Chicago Union Stockyards and director of the 1893 Chicago World's Fair. His family had one of the largest farms in America and created the first commercial hybrid corn. His grandson traveled extensively for the Funk Brothers Seed Co. and collected gems and minerals from around the world. The farm was electrified in 1910 (first in the world) and the 13-room home, built in 1864, has been extensively restored to its original condition. The museum houses more than 4,000 specimens, from gemstones of every type to an intact saber-toothed tiger skull! **The cost of the bus trip is \$5.00/person.**
